



CASABLANCA, ON THE WESTERN COAST OF MO-ROCCO, was the scene of one of the most momentous r litary conferences in hisearlier this month when 'ent Roosevelt, Prime Min Winston Churchill. Giraud and De the Free French and a host of other micary leaders assembled there to map the 1943 war strategy of the United Nations. Utmost secrecy veiled the meeting from the rest of the world until it was announced last night. President Roosevelt flew to the scene, his first airplane trip since his first nomination in 1932. One of the immediate tasks agreed upon at the conference was the ousting of all Axis forces from North Africa. At present the Axis is clinging to the Tunsian corner. Jan 27 - 43


