

“Somewhere Over There.”

Miss Dora Pasley of Piney Creek has received a letter from her brother Pvt. James H. Pasley, Co. F 54 Inf. A. E. F. who is somewhere in France under date of August 20, 1918.

Dearest Sister; Will answer your letter received today, was glad to hear from you all; it is the first letter I have had from home in over a month. I am well and truly hope this will find you all the same. Guess you all have been having fine time going to the big meetings, haven't you? I would love to be there for the August meeting but guess I can't. Well Dora I like here about as well as any place I have been since I have been in the army but there is lots of places I had rather be. Would rather be around Piney Creek if you can guess where. Tell my girl something good for me and that I will write her when I have time. I had a letter from Ida today and also one from Floyd Warden written June 1st and I just got it today. Tell Papa I don't think we will be over here long, I think the war will soon be over. We can hear the big guns roaring every day. We have got the Germans on the run and we hope to keep them that way. Japan is fighting now and Russia has come back and is doing some good fighting. They are threshing wheat here now, it reminds me of grinding cane, they have a horse pulling the sweep around just like a cane mill. Dora there is some pretty girls around here but I can't talk to them or understand them but I guess I will bring one back with me just the same. With love and best wishes, I will close for this time, Your Brother.
