The Star is in receipt of the following letter from Pvt Thomas Walter H. Harris, U. S. General Hospital No. 14 Ft. Oglethorpe, GA

I wish to express my opinion as to what the Y. M. C. A. is doing for the boys at this camp. It is giving them all kinds of amusement, lectures, concerts and everything to make them comfortable and happy; we have Sunday School and preaching every Sunday morning, picture shows during the week. The Y. M. C. A. is a soldiers' home in every respect the way I look at it, It furnishes the boys their paper and envelopes and also is a library; we can get any kind of a book we want to read any time and have typewriters, but not many of the boys that can use them; it is a reception hall in one respect for the boys to gather in for their games. I can't tell how much comfort it has been to me since I came to the hospital; it gives them comfort when they are thinking of home for most of them get a little home-sick at times. Well as this is from an Alleghany boy, I wish to say to them that have not gone to camp, that army life is fine. They will enjoy it, after they have been there a short time, as I have myself. I will close saying that we boys of the USA are going after the Kaiser.
